

"In Black and White" with author Sheila White, New Black history told in a fresh new way accompanied by vintage slides, Sheila will walk us through the fascinating story behind her biographical novel, "The Letters: Postmark Prejudice in Black and White" (Yorkland Publishing, 2023) about her parents' contentious, interracial marriage in Toronto in 1947.

Scarborough-born Sheila White

has worn many hats, starting as a community news reporter and editor in the 1970s. She then worked in politics and media for many years. She is a writer, a musician and songwriter, and an environmentalist.

Sheila is Music Director and a licensed lay chaplain for Don Heights Unitarian Congregation in Don Mills. We hosted Sheila and her choir a few years ago when she came to talk about her famous aunt Portia White, the concert singer. This is Sheila's third time with us as a guest speaker.

2023 saw the Yorkland Publishing release of "The Letters: Postmark Prejudice in Black and White, Sheila's debut novel, which has been described as "unputdownable."

In September 2022, Sheila received a Queen's Platinum Jubilee Medal Recipient from the Province of Nova Scotia for anti-racism work. She was a Member of the federal government's National Apology Advisory Committee, and Chair of its Communications and Community Engagement Sub-committee.

Sheila was a 2020 Urban Hero Award Winner for her environmental volunteer work and a "Canada 150" medal recipient in 2017 for Outstanding Contributions to Community. In 2014, Sheila received an African Canadian Achievement Award in the Politics category.

PRESIDENT PAT'S SPOTLIGHT THE HONOURABLE ALAN REDWAY & MRS. LOUISE REDWAY

A brief History of the former Mayor of the Borough of East York from 1976-1982.

During his almost 10 years in Parliament while serving Canada as Minister of State (housing) he travelled widley in our country including to almost every settlement in the Arctic.

Monday, March 11, 1935 Alan Arthur Sydney Redway was born in Women's College Hospital, Toronto (an only child) to Alan and Phyllis Redway. His parents grew up in Toronto: Alan's father on Bain Avenue, and his mother Phyllis on Simpson Avenue.

Alan attended Rolph Road Public School Kindergarden from age 5. He remembered (chuckle) that if you were a bad boy during school you would have to stand behind the piano. He learned and forgot to play the piano. The last piece he was

able to play usually in July or August was White Christmas.

After Rolf Road Alan went onto Leaside High...

1958...he received his degree in Commerce and Finance from the University of Toronto.

1961...he received his law degree from Osgoode Hall 1962...April 21 he married his true love (Mary) Louise Harvey a Teacher from Cobourg,

1963...January, he was called to the Bar after marrying Louise. They have 2 daughters,

Kim and Andrea and 2 grandchildren, a grandson Thomson (14) and a granddaughter Sydney (12).

Louise grew up in an 1880 heritage home on the SE corner of George and Park Streets in Cobourg...

1980... the Hon. Alan Redway was involved as one of the key instrumentals in the formation of the East York Historical Society with EYHS first President John S. Ridout (1980-2003) He spent 4 years as Vice President and resigned in 2017 to complete the writings of his second book East York 1924-1997: Toronto's Garden of Eden but the Life Member continues to be of great support to the East York Historical Society. Thank you!

Redway Road, is in the former Borough of East York.

1997...Redway as Honorary Chair of Team East York actively opposed the Toronto amalgamation.

2010...December 31, he retired from Law practise and have since been involved with Volunteer activities: Past Chair of Daily Bread Food Bank, Eastminster United and St. Brigid's Annex Out of the Cold programs

2014...Published his first book GOVERNING TORONTO Bringing Back The City That Worked

2018...Published his second book EAST YORK 1924-1997: Toronto's Garden of Eden

Currently he writes a monthly column in the East York Chronicle Magazine.

THE BIRTH OF EAST YORK



Hon. Alan Redway

Almost two hundred years ago when the few thousand people in the little community then known as York were incorporated as the original city of Toronto, the present megacity of Toronto was made up of 4 separately incorporated municipalities: the Townships of Etobicoke, York, Scarborough and the City of Toronto. One hundred years later in 1924 the present

megacity of Toronto was made up of 13 separately incorporated municipalities. The last one of these to be incorporated was the Township of East York.

East York was incorporated as a direct result of the incorporation of North York 2 years earlier. That resulted in the reminder of York Township being split into two entirely separate parts. In order to travel from one part to the other it was necessary to go through at least one other separately incorporated municipality. So, after examining the options the York Township Council petitioned the Provincial government asking it to incorporate the eastern part of the Township as a separate municipality.

The province granted the request but with the condition that a majority of the residents vote in favour of it. The Provincial government of the day, the United Farmers of Ontario, believed in grassroots democracy unlike the present governments, at all levels, that tell us rather than ask us what to do. In this case the outcome of the vote was by no means certain.

A few years earlier the businesspeople of eastern York Township had petitioned the now greatly expanded City of Toronto to annex them into the City and Toronto City Council not only agreed but put the bureaucratic wheels in motion to do just that. But that was 1913, the next year WWI broke out and that put the plan on the back burner never to surface again until the end of WWII. The vote to incorporate the Township of East York passed by a wide margin.

So, on January 1st, 1924, the Township of East York was


The incorporating legislation spelled out the boundaries of the new Township in terms of those of already existing municipalities. The eastern boundary was western boundary of the Township of Scarborough.

the present megacity of Toronto by amalgamating the Borough of East York with the Cities of what was then Toronto, Etobicoke, York, North York and Scarborough. Today, we think of that as Victoria Park Avenue, but in 1924 Victoria Park didn't extend north of the Danforth. The northern boundary was the southern boundary of the Township of North York, but that was far from clear either in 1924. Part of North York was south of Eglinton Avenue, but part was well north of it. Besides that, Eglinton was not connected between Leaside and Don Mills Road until 1956.

The legislation incorporating the Township of East York made no mention of Leaside whatsoever. Leaside had been incorporated as a Town with a population of about 20 people in 1913. In 1924 before the Leaside Bridge was built its population would have been a few hundred if that. If East York, with a population of 20,000, had applied to the Courts when it was incorporated for a declaration that Leaside was now part of East York, the merger of the two municipalities would have happened in 1924 rather than 40 years later in 1967.

The western boundary was the eastern boundary of the City of Toronto north of the Bloor Viaduct. Now by 1924, the city had already annexed Rosedale, The Town of North Toronto and Moore Park but it had not annexed any land east of the ravine through which the current Mud Creek now runs, original residents called it Yellow Creek because the water was the colour of urine, so as a result, much of the Don Valley, the existing community of Governor's Bridge and the future community of Bennington Heights were in the Township of East York not in the City of Toronto, notwithstanding they were on the west side of the Don Valley. The southern boundary was also the northern boundary of the City of Toronto on the east side of the Don Valley which is usually thought of as the centre of Danforth Avenue. But that city boundary in 1924, ran north of the Danforth in some parts, in the centre in some parts and south of it near Victoria Park. That is why Shoppers Word Danforth was in East York not the city. The difficulty in locating that boundary was solved by the fire hydrants on the lawns of homes side by side. The northern hydrant was in East York the southern one was in the city.

The Provincial government reduced the 13 municipalities that then made up the present City of Toronto to 6 in 1967 when it merged the Township of East York with the Town of Leaside to create the Borough of East York. On January 1st,1998 the Provincial government created the present megacity of Toronto by amalgamating the Borough of East York with the Cities of what was then Toronto, Etobicoke, York, North York and Scarborough.



Henry Box Brown Lane & North Star Way Unveiling

In honour of Black History Month, a newly designated North-South laneway running parallel to Bright Street and

St. Paul Street will be officially named Henry Box Brown Lane. Additionally, a horizontal laneway intersecting Henry Box Brown Lane will be officially named North Star Way.

Henry Brown, an enslaved man from Louisa County, Virginia, lived from 1815 to 1897. In 1849, he courageously escaped the chains of southern slavery by nailing himself into a shipping crate.

ultimately finding safety in Philadelphia. From there, he made his way to Toronto, Ontario, to share his remarkable story.

Following his emancipation in Toronto, Brown dedicated himself to educating people about the injustices of slavery. His autobiography and the accounts of those who knew him served as powerful tools in achieving this mission. While in Canada, Henry Brown supported himself as a magician and performer. In 1887, "The Brown Family" participated in a benefit concert at St. Lawrence Hall, contributing to the community while residing on Bright


Street in Corktown. The unveiling of Henry Box Brown Lane is scheduled for February 1st at noon, marking the commencement of Black History Month in 2024.

Adjacent to Henry Box Brown Lane, on its North side, a horizontal laneway will be named North Star Way, symbolizing the connection to the Underground Railroad and the ongoing struggle for black emancipation.

The North Star, often referred to as Polaris, served as a guiding light for navigation, aiding travellers in determining direction. Known as the "Going Home Star," this celestial marker played a crucial role during the Civil War and holds significance

in various stories and publications. Additionally, the North Star and its symbol carry cultural importance for both indigenous and non-indigenous communities across Canada. To the First Nations Cree people, the North Star signifies "The one that never moves," embodying the resilience of Indigenous community spirit. The unveiling of North Star Way is anticipated to take place on February 1st at 12:00 PM along with the unveiling of Henry Box Brown Lane, in celebration and recognition of the first day of Black History Month in 2024. Norman Jewison, Commitment to Life & to Social Justice



Childhood: Noman Jewison was born in his grand-mother's house at 63 Lee Ave in The Beaches, By the age of 5 his

mother had him reciting poems for large audiences all over the East End. He could memorize information easily. He would charge the other children in the neighbourhood 2 cents for him to go to the movies, which cost 5 cents (pocket the profits), come back and recite the entire movie with all of the sound effects.. He was a born entertainer. "I always thought I was Jewish because when I was growing up...I was always called "Jewy" or "Jewboy". I grew up in a very anti-semitic neighbourhood. The East End of Toronto was very tough. I played a dual role, until one day someone asked me, "What kind of Jew are vou?" His cover was blown! Growing up in the Depression, he did a number of odd jobs, one of which was walking horses at Woodbine Racetrack. For a time he drove a cab where he says he got a chance to see human behaviour up close. See CBC player link for more: https://www.cbc.ca/player/play/650095171549 Life-Changing Moment: Norman served in the Canadian navy during World War II. He was on leave toward the end of the war — only 18 years old and in uniform — when he got on a bus in Memphis, Tenn.: "It was a hot, hot day, and I saw a window open at the

back so I headed to the back of the bus. And I sat down with my bag and by the open window.

The bus driver looked at me, and I could see his face in the mirror. He says, 'Are you trying to be funny, sailor?' He says, 'Can't you read the sign?' And there was a little sign and it said, 'Colored people to the rear.' "

Jewison looked around and saw that he was the only white passenger in the back. "I was just a kid, but I was kind of shocked," he said.

"I thought, well, the only thing I could do is get off the bus." It was his first experience with racial prejudice and, he says, it laid the groundwork for 1967's "In the Heat of the Night.". It won five Oscars, including Best Picture. On his way to becoming the acclaimed director we know him as today, he worked as a television producer in the late 1950s, of shows like the Hit Parade and TV specials like Tonight with Belafonte, where they lost 27 stations before the end of the program. "I think it was then, (hitchhiking) along the highways of Tennessee, Alabama, Mississippi, and Louisiana, that the desire to make films like In the Heat of the Night and A Soldier's Story took root," wrote Jewison in, This Terrible Business... "Racism and injustice are two themes I have come back to, again and again, in my films." "Every time a film deals with racism, many Americans feel uncomfortable," he wrote. "Yet it has to be confronted. We have to deal with prejudice and injustice or we will never understand what is good and evil, right and wrong; we need to feel

For the last 14 years, Susan served as my Executive Assistant and worked closely with me to achieve many extraordinary projects in Toronto-Danforth. Her work was seminal in relocating the Red Door Shelter into a condo on Queen St E, troubleshooting and gaining successful approvals to help establish Crow's Theatre at Carlaw and Dundas, establishing the popular skate trail at Greenwood Park and getting numerous affordable housing projects approved and underway, like the soon to be open Riverdale Co-op on Queen East.

As well as her top-level skills in advancing such projects, Susan was very dedicated to the residents of Toronto-Danforth, setting a very high standard for community responsiveness. She was a go-to problem solver for City staff and was well-respected by senior leaders at City Hall as well as community and agency leaders.

Before her many years at City Hall, Susan worked at Artscape as the Director of Community Development where her projects included the creation of Gibraltar Point Arts Centre as well as the popular Wychwood Barns. For many years, her prior work at Theatre Direct, the Bathurst Street Theatre and Theatre Passe Murielle contributed greatly to the Toronto arts and theatre scene.

Susan was a key player in the development of Arts Vote in the 1990s, which put Arts and Culture on the agenda at City Council and City Hall. Susan's strong arts background and dedication allowed us to initiate the City's Arts in the Park movement in 2009, which is highly successful and a staple across the entire city.

Susan will be dearly missed by her family, friends, colleagues and the city that she loved. TFN members were saddened to learn that Aarne Juhola passed away on September 13th at the age of 88.

For 30 years, Helen and Aarne Juhola played vital leadership roles in the TFN – she as editor of the newsletter and very active in advocacy work, while he assumed less visible, yet vitally important, administrative roles. In addition to serving on the board for many years, in 1982 he was appointed Secretary-Treasurer, a role in which he applied rigorous cost-benefit thinking. Pinky Franklin told me how she respected Aarne for his dedication after seeing the ledgers in which he kept meticulous handwritten records – a painstaking task in those days when TFN had no computer. Over the years, Helen and Aarne frequently led botany outings together.

In 2005, when they announced their decision to retire, then-President Robin Powell applauded "the unparalleled extent, duration and quality of their volunteer work that had made them both the very foundations of the Toronto Field Naturalists as we now know it." TFN decided to pay tribute to this remarkable couple by naming a portion of our Nature Reserves near Uxbridge in their honour. In May 2006 a large group of members gathered at the reserves to celebrate the occasion, and a plaque was installed as a permanent record of our appreciation for their valuable contributions to our organization over so many years.





Our board recently received a box of information from Lynn Ridout of files in her father's possession before his death. I was thrilled to find minutes from the two earlier East York Historical Societies and thought you might enjoy learning about them.

The first EYHS started in March 1961 and continued until 1969 after Canada's centennial and the second started in November 1974 to celebrate East York's Golden (50th) Anniversary and it ceased in 1977. Our present Society started in November 1980.

I will start with the first Society and continue with the others in future newsletters.

On March 20, 1961 Miss True Davidson called a meeting of interested people in the Township to consider forming a Historical Society for East York. They agreed this should be done and discussion followed about how to do it. The next meeting was in January 1962 and True Davidson was named Chairman of the Organizing Committee. Research was to be started as follows:

- a) Dr. Edwin C. Guillet on what is available in printed form in East York
- b) Mr. Leslie Saunders on the beginnings and change in government
- c) Mr. James Fletcher on the historical sites in East York
- d) Mr. Percy C. Bustin on the historical significance of street names
- e) Mr. Walter Stewart on interesting photographic material of the East York story
- f) Mr. George A. Heaton on obtaining interesting material from "old timers"
- g) Mrs. G.O. Morgan on interesting material from the local churches
- h) Mrs. N.H. Smith on interesting material re fairs and parks
- i) Mr. T. M. Weatherhead on schools of East York and any interesting stories from Bennington Heights
- i) Miss J. Farquharson on hospitals

The Hon. R.H. McGregor would be invited to be Honorary President and Dr. Guillet to be official historian of the EYHS. Meetings would be held at the East York Public Library. Mrs. Weatherhead was elected secretary of the Organizing Committee.

The next meeting was on Feb. 16, 1962. Charles Sauriol attended and donated maps, documents, photos and manuscripts of the story of the Don Valley. He offered to contact the Bater family for their information.

The first open meeting of the Society was March 22, 1962. Each member gave a 5 minute presentation on their research and then people reminisced about the early

days of East York. Meetings continued at intervals in 1962 with members reporting the results of their research and nurturing plans for future work.

Meetings were held at intervals in 1963 with discussion of a suitable project for Canada's centennial. They decided to acquire the houses and mill in the valley and the historical site at Todmorden Mills became the centennial project. This was formally approved by the Ontario government.

OUR MAY 2015 NEWSETTER WILL FEATURE ANOTHER ARTICLE

THE HISTORY OF EAST YORK HISTORICAL SOCIETY - continued By Margaret McRae.

Article continued from EY Inklings March 2015 (there was no continuation in May 2015) and published in EY Inklings September 2015 Newsletter.

In the March newsletter I started telling you about the first East York Historical Society which in 1963 decided to acquire the houses and mill at Todmorden Mills and make Todmorden Mills their centennial project.

Several meetings were held in 1964 by the East York Historical Committee. Plans were made for building restoration at Todmorden Mills with architect Peter Stokes in charge.

In 1965 meetings dealt with discussion of periods, their dress, utensils, decor etc. They hunted in the archives for information. Restoration of the houses began in May 1966. The date of furnishing of the Parshall Terry House would be 1837 and the Helliwell House would be 1850 to 1867. There was discussion of proper museum records and of plans for the 1967 opening. In 1967 several meetings were held in conjunction with the Centennial Committee. All activities centered on the historic site. Members painted walls, and cleaned to get the site ready for the opening on May 22nd. Many members in costume assisted in the houses and museum to bring visitors through. When it opened for the season, members became guides and all spare time was devoted to the site so research and meetings were suspended.

In 1968 a few meetings were held but May through October activities centered around Todmorden Mills. In 1969 a couple of meetings were held but they ceased in June because of the pressure of work called for at Todmorden Mills. No further meetings were held because interest was all concentrated on the one project, Todmorden Mills Historic Site.

In November I will write about the second attempt at a historical society in the 1970's.

The articles were not continued. **Note**: EYHS President Pat Barnett requested this "box of information" from Lynn Ridout. Also, EYHS President PBarnett's thoughts are that these early inceptions were more like an East York Historical Committee whose focus was research rather than being a Society.

Toronto City Council approves "Sankofa Square" as new name for Yonge-Dundas Square

In fall 2021, the Recognition Review CAC was formed to develop a shortlist of new names for Dundas Street and other City-owned assets bearing the Dundas name. The 20-member CAC brings together Black and Indigenous leaders and other Dundas Street residents and business owners. The CAC reached consensus on the name "Sankofa" Square" for Yonge-Dundas Square at its December 12, 2023 meeting.

Pending TTC Board decision, the City and TTC will work in consultation with Toronto Metropolitan University to rename Dundas Station and with advice from the Recognition Review Community Advisory Committee to rename Dundas West Station. The Jane/Dundas Public Library is proposed to be renamed by the Toronto Public Library Board in collaboration with the City.

Dundas Station will be renamed Sankofa Square by the end of 02 2024.

FUN FACT: January 21 was Lincoln Alexander Day. Lincoln Alexander was the first Black person elected to Canada's

Federal Parliament in 1968. He was also the first Black Federal Cabinet Minister and he became the first Black Lieutenant Governor of Ontario in 1985.

FUN QUIZ: Did Lincoln Alexander attend school in East York, Riverdale, Riverside and Leslieville?

Earlier this month, the City of Toronto announced plans to rename Yonge-Dundas Square Sankofa Square. This has been a Controversial announcement.

Sankofa originates from the Akan people of Ghana and is associated with the proverb: "It is not wrong to go back for that which you have forgotten" and represents the importance of learning from the past.

The ports of Ghana were one of the largest hubs of the Transatlantic Slave Trade and witnessed the trafficking of millions of enslaved individuals and families en route to the Americas. Thousands of these individuals and their families then arrived in Canada seeking freedom via the Underground Railroad.

Yonge-Dundas Square is situated within and on the boundaries of the historic Macaulaytown (later known as St. John's Ward / The Ward). Emerging in the early 19th century and absorbed by the City of Toronto in 1834, Macaulaytown was Toronto's first multicultural and largely immigrant neighbourhood. This neighbourhood has been largely





obliterated during waves of subsequent redevelopment with only a handful of fragments remaining. Hundreds of individuals who arrived in Toronto via the Underground Railroad during the early-to-mid 19th century settled in Macaulaytown (St. John's Ward / The Ward). By the 1830s/1840s, it had become Toronto's largest Black community and remained an important hub for decades. Alongside Macaulaytown, another Black community emerged along the southern portions of nearby Church Street and Victoria Street during this period and another in Seaton Village closer to the Confederation period.

Many of those who came to call Toronto home — and their ancestors — would have passed through the ports of Ghana.







With help from a family friend and connections in the cloth manufacturing the business, he opened Harry Rosen Inc., on Feb 4, 1954, in Cabbagetown, Toronto, with his brother Lou.


