

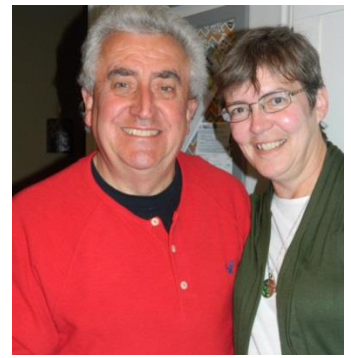

Now it's Carol Burtin Fripp's turn as Agnes Macphail Award winner

Leaside activist Carol Burtin Fripp said she is flattered to receive this year's Agnes Macphail Award.

Toronto and East York Community Council accepted the recommendation from the Agnes Macphail Recognition Committee on Feb. 5 to name Burtin Fripp as the award winner.

Burtin Fripp said she knew the award well, having nominated former East York mayor and MP Alan Redway for the award in 2013. She currently serves as co-president of the Leaside Property Owners Association with 2008 Agnes Macphail honouree Geoff Kettel. But she was not expecting to receive the award herself, she said in a phone interview. She understands she was nominated by community members, including former community newspaper

publisher Harry Goldhar and former East York councillor Norman Crone, Burtin Fripp said.

The award was established by the Borough of East York in 1994 in honour of Agnes Macphail (1890–1954), an organizer and progressive politician who was the first woman elected to Parliament in Canada. She was also one of the two first women elected to the provincial legislature, representing York East riding, which included much of East York. Recently her image has appeared on the Canadian \$10-bill.

The Agnes Macphail Award annually recognizes an outstanding volunteer living within the boundaries of the former borough. Burtin Fripp is the 25th recipient of the award.

The life and influence of a “powerful and significant” force in the East York and Ontario black community is about to get another signpost —literally— marking the memory and legacy of the late **Stanley G. Grizzle**.



With February being Black History Month, the decision today by the **Toronto and East York Community Council** to name a laneway after him near where he lived and raised his family is “perfect timing,” **East York Historical Society** president **Pancheta (Pat) Barnett** told the meeting at which it was unanimously approved.

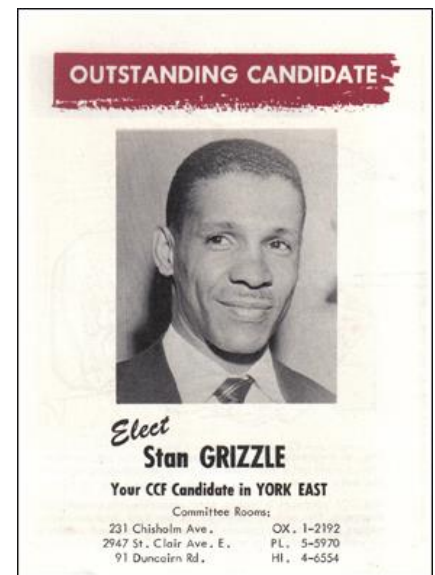
The laneway runs northerly from the TTC subway station on Main Street to Doncaster Avenue and, his daughter **Pamela** told the meeting, was where “I cut through to get to **Hope United Church** on Sundays and played over many years” growing up in the family home at [231 Chisholm Avenue](http://231ChisholmAvenue) and living in the area for 60 years.

One of East York’s most notable historical personages, Mr. Grizzle, who passed away at age 97 in November of 2016, was the first black person to run for the provincial legislature (in the old York East riding in the area) and the first black Citizenship Court judge as well as a recipient of both the Order of Canada and the Order of Ontario.

Grizzle, who was active in the Toronto chapter of the **Brotherhood of Sleeping Car Porters Union** in his youth while working for a railroad, was later “responsible for bringing black workers into the local labour movement” Ward 31 Councillor **Janet Davis** told the meeting, and worked for many years for the **Ontario Labour Relations Board**.

“He was an incredible leader in the black community,” Ms. Davis said. “He was very interesting and obviously had a very powerful and significant role in all the things he did.” His activities also included advocating for racial equality and while president of the local BSCP got the **Canadian Pacific Railway** to open its management ranks to black employees for the first time.

In 2007 a Main Street park across from the subway station was named for him, and many documents and other artifacts he had accumulated over the years have been placed with the Toronto Archives and the Canadian Archives, Davis noted.

Ms. Grizzle said she was “thrilled to death” that the laneway naming is now coming about because she “has so many great memories of that area” and that “Dad would be thrilled if he was alive,” she added.

Mr. Grizzle’s grand-daughter, **Mosadi Brown**, who told the meeting that she “had a special relationship” with him, said that “I’ve got goosebumps; it really does mean a lot to have this recognition of his life and his legacy.”

It can be expected an unveiling ceremony will be held in the laneway sometime this spring or early summer, when an historical plaque will be also be installed along with the signposts, Davis said.

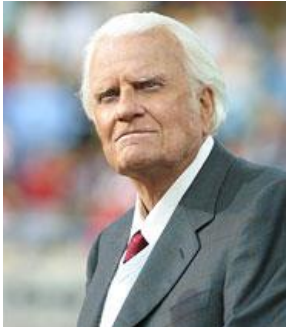

East York Historical Society General Meeting
In celebration of Black History
Tuesday evening, January 30, 2018

Summary by Jeffrey Brown, Secretary, EYHS

Pat Barnett, President of East York Historical Society opened the meeting with special acknowledgement of new members who joined the society since the previous meeting.

She then called upon the members to share any important announcements about upcoming events.

Pat then announced that she received a special acknowledgement from The Right Honourable Justin P. J. Trudeau, Prime Minister of Canada, promoting the EYHS Black History Month event.

A representative from the office of Nathaniel Erskine-Smith, Liberal MP for Beaches-East York (Ontario) read the acknowledgement.

Pat Barnett also presented the 2017 EYHS certificate of appreciation to Lifetime Member Hon. Alan Redway, former Mayor of East York, recognizing his dedication and hard work in serving the East York Historical Society.

There was a string performance by grade 7 and 8 students from Sistema Toronto (Jane and Finch) in support of Black History Month.

Next up was our special guest presenter, Stanley E. Grizzle, son of the late Judge Stanley G. Grizzle (November 18, 1918 – November 12, 2016), who spoke about the Grizzle Family of East York.

Ms. Mosadi Brown, granddaughter of the late Judge Stanley G. Grizzle, also shared some very informative and poignant moments of her life with her grandfather.

The meeting was hugely attended by many members of EYHS, guests, family of Stanley G. Grizzle, and several dignitaries including Janet Davis, City Councillor, Ward 31, Beaches-East York; Arthur Potts, Liberal Ontario MPP Beaches-East York, and Honourable Alan Redway, PC, QC, former Mayor of East York.

HON. ALAN REDWAY'S summary of Doug Gibson
Presenter on February 21, 2018 - Canadian Authors' Links to East York.

On Wednesday afternoon, February 21st, Douglas Gibson, long time editor of McClelland and Stewart book publishers and a recent recipient of the Order of Canada, took the members of the EYHS on a voyage across Canada from coast to coast to coast stopping at each city or community to highlight a great Canadian novelist who lived or did their writing there.

Missing from his talk were some of their connections with the former Borough of East York. Margaret Atwood, for instance, grew up in Bennington Heights and described many of her East York neighbours in her early books. Terry Fallis grew up on Parkhurst Blvd. in East York and still lives in the former Borough on Crandall Road. Lucy Maud Montgomery's son Dr. MacDonald lived for many years at the corner of Bessborough Drive and Glenvale Blvd. in the former Borough of East York.

McClelland and Stewart itself was at one time located in the O'Connor industrial area while one of its former owners, Avi Bennett who also lived in Bennington Heights and use to get after me as his Alderman to improve the Bennington Heights tennis courts, was earlier in his illustrious career together with his father and brother the owners of Principal Investments which redeveloped the former Ford and later the Nash, Rambler automobile assembly plant in East York south of the Danforth at Victoria Park Avenue, into what is now Shoppers World Danforth.

Despite all that, Mr. Gibson's presentation was both enlightening and enjoyable

President Pat's Spotlight

Sandra McNamara



Sandra McNamara UE graduated from York University in 1983 with a combined Applied Mathematics and Earth Science Degree as a Geophysicist. She worked in the field, as well as doing research, to which she has had a couple papers published. While at PGW she oversaw the digitization of the African Airbourne Magnetic Maps; presented a paper in Tanzania and worked on the compilation of the Ontario Aeromagnetic Maps. For the past 24 years she has been a stay at home mom.

Always having an active and inquisitive mind, Sandra began to focus her research skills to the genealogy of her father's side of the family always keeping in mind her Grandmother saying "I come from a strong Loyalist stock." Looking through the names and dates, it became apparent that her Grandmother was correct. Delving back to founding families of New Jersey, (who moved from Rhode Island), combined with the early settlers of New York, Sandra discovered that after five generations, these same families moved during and after the Revolutionary War to become some of the founding families along the shores of Lake Erie in Norfolk County.

To honour her Grandmother, Clara Leone Woolley Brookfield, Sandra found proofs and documentation that their land in Shrewsbury, Monmouth Co., New Jersey was confiscated and sold. Searching for the ties that bonded her to those ancestors, she proved to Daniel Woolley in 2012. A Loyalist family that was not on the UELAC directory was being recognized. Sandra has also proven to Isaac Gilbert (2012).

Sandra joined the East York Historical Society in 2016, and is becoming an actively involved member. Her interest in East York can be traced back to her Great-great grandparents, Margaret Ann Elizabeth Pedlar who arrived as a young girl of 8 in 1854 with her parents John Pedlar and Grace Rowcliffe. Ann's future husband, George Arnold arrived three years afterwards at the age of 14 years. Currently, I am uncertain as to whether he travelled with or without his parents, as there is a discrepancy to his age (which would indicate either his year of arrival is off by three or he was actually 11 when coming to Canada); however by the time of his marriage in 1871 both his parents, George Arnold and Eliza Pomphrett were living in East York.

Family history has it that there was once a blacksmith shop on the northeast corner of Broadview and Danforth (where the Bank of Commerce now stands). Unable to pay the back taxes in the depression, the land was confiscated by the city and lost to the family. Often I have

wondered if the small space where the MacDonald's is next to the bank may have been where the shop was located, and the stables where the bank now sits. I can easily picture this, as the chimney stack from the MacDonald's is old, the building size about the space a blacksmith shop would take up.

Expanding her family trees and interests through ancestry, while making numerous friendships with members of the above groups and by researching through Facebook, she believes in helping people discover their past.

Sandra's latest endeavour is researching into "The Declaration of Dependence". This important, yet relatively unknown document was signed in late November of 1776 in New York. Upon this important, yet relatively unknown document, are the signatures of 547 persons who wished to express their Loyalty to the Crown – 491 more signatures than the Declaration of Independence. By signing this petition, they effectively were signing a death penalty if the new country of America was formed. Sandra has just begun her new career presenting historical and genealogy papers, with speaking engagements in Mattawa, Toronto, Brantford, Ajax and Hamilton. Presentations in Brantford, Toronto and Niagara in early 2018 have met with success and more are scheduled for Brampton, Dundas, Woodstock and Napanee.

The Dentonia Park - Massey Connection

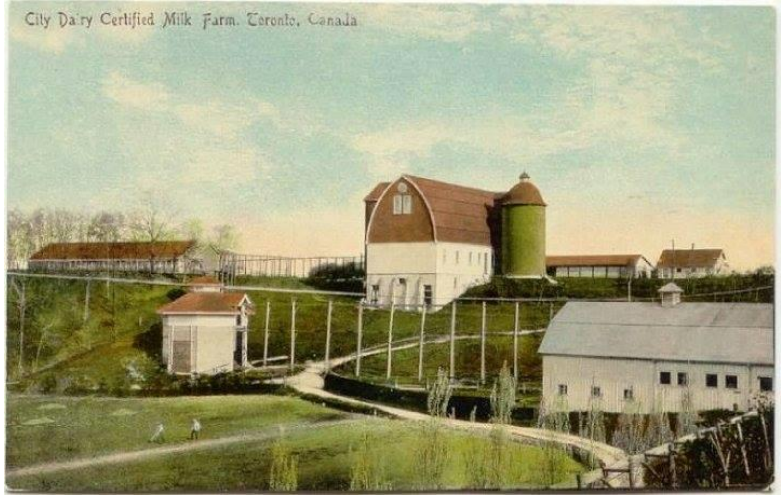

On the west side of Dentonia Park, east of Dawes Road just north of Danforth Avenue, you may be able to see this plaque on a post underneath a tree. Erected by the East York Historical Society in 2006, it tells how the farm became integrated into our city over the years. Here's the plaque text:

In 1897, Walter Massey, President of Massey-Harris Company, purchased about 100 hecta acres of land to establish an experimental farm. Walter named the farm "Dentonia Park" after his wife, Susan Marie Denton. The farm produced eggs and poultry as well as trout. Dentonia was also the home of a prized dairy herd that sparked the formation of the City Dairy Company. The City Dairy produced the first pasteurized milk in Canada, which helped to combat tuberculosis and typhoid fever among Toronto children. In 1901, Walter Massey passed away after contracting typhoid fever, but Susan continued to operate Dentonia Park Farm well after his death. Walter's brother, Chester (and his children Vincent and Raymond) and Susan's children (Ruth, Madeline, Dorothy and Denton) also lived at Dentonia. The Goulding Estate was built in 1921 for Dorothy Massey Goulding.

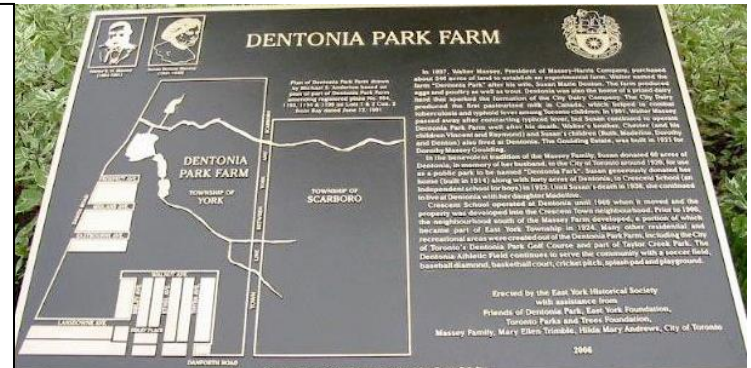
In the benevolent tradition of the Massey family, Susan donated 25 hecta acres of Dentonia, in memory of her husband, to the City of Toronto around 1926, for use as a public park to be named "Dentonia Park". Susan generously donated her home (a 100 room home built in 1914) along with 16 hecta acres of Dentonia, to Crescent School (an independent school for boys) in 1933. Until Susan's death in 1938, she continued to live at Dentonia with her daughter Madeline.

Crescent School operated at Dentonia until 1969 when it moved to Bayview Ave and the property was developed into the Crescent Town neighbourhood. Prior to 1900, the neighbourhood south of the Massey Farm developed, a portion of which became part of East York Township in 1924. Many other residential and recreational areas were created out of the Dentonia Park Farm, including the City of Toronto's Dentonia Park Golf Course and part of Taylor Creek Park. The Dentonia Athletic Field continues to serve the community with a soccer field, baseball diamond, basketball court, cricket pitch, splash pad and playground.
