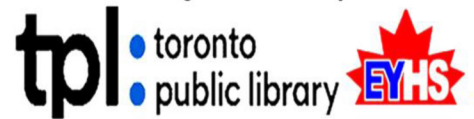

Lyndhursts' Coach Says His Team Will Win World's Hockey Title



Despite critical references to their ability, Toronto's East York Lyndhursts departed for Europe this morning casually confident that they will return in two months with the world's hockey championship. Coach Greg Currie reported that his players were aroused at some of the adverse criticism directed at them and,

he figured, it would make them work all the harder to defeat their opposition in the big tournament at Sweden. Currie, who has been receiving reports on the opposition, said flatly that his team will win. Lyndhursts, who left for New York this morning, where they will board the Queen Mary, are shown above. East York Lyndhurst Hockey Team

Does anyone remember the 1954 East York Lyndhurst Senior B hockey team? The team was sponsored by Lyndhurst Motors, then located on the Danforth. One of the players on that team was George Sayliss who grew up on Rumsey Road opposite Trace Manes Park just a few blocks from where I grew up myself. George was a forward on the East York Lyndhurst Senior B team that represented Canada in the 1954 World Hockey Tournament held in Stockholm Sweden.

His sister Pat Cole -Sayliss told me that as a kid her brother played hockey morning, noon and night on natural ice at Trace Manes Park (at the time called Millwood Park). George says he would refuse to take off his skates and ate his dinner sitting on his front steps. He played hockey with his friends Peter Conacher and Jack Caffrey. On Sunday mornings, Sandy Bruce the Leaside Police Chief would arrive on his bicycle and kick the boys off the ice because the sound of the puck hitting the boards was disturbing the members of Leaside United Church.

George's friend Peter Conacher who lived on Millwood Road, went on to play in the NHL with Chicago Black Hawks, New York Rangers and Toronto Maple Leafs. Jack Caffrey who grew up on Hanna Road later played for the Boston Bruins. George Sayliss was a NHL calibre player himself. He played his first organized hockey with a team sponsored by St. Anselm's Church before going on to play Junior A with the Marlboros and later with Stratford. George was in line for a tryout with the New York Rangers when he cracked his wrist. It took 6 months to knit ending his professional hockey career before it started. After a stint of Senior A in Renfrew, George joined the Toronto Fire Department. That same year 1953, he and an East York fire fighter Doug Gray were invited to join the East York Lyndhurst team in the Metropolitan Toronto League. Then in 1954 they were off to the Hockey World Championships.

Despite the media pundits' criticism of the team's ability, before it sailed for Europe on the Queen Mary (in 1954 non-stop air travel was for the future) our Lyndhurst team was confident, according their coach Greg Currie, that in two months they would return home with the World Hockey Championship.

George Sayliss told me that prior to the Soviet game Lyndhurst had trounced Norway, Sweden, Finland, Czechoslovakia, Switzerland and West Germany, out-scoring them by 57 to 5 in contrast to the Soviet Red Army team who beat the same opponents by the score of 30 to 8. The Canada-Soviet final game was played on outdoor natural ice in a snow storm at Stockholm, Sweden before a crowd of 20,000. In spite of the snow the ice was soft. One Lyndhurst player said his skates sank into the ice behind the

Soviet goal. The Moscow Dynamos Red Army team featuring future international hockey stars, Lev Yashin and Vsevolod Bobrov, relied on speed and finesse while our East York team playing the usual Canadian style physical game drew a number of penalties called by the European referees including two by George Sayliss,. When the Soviets won that game 7 to 2, a collective groan went up across Canada. It was the first time that Canada had lost a World Championship hockey game. It would not be the last.

Hard on the heels of our East York Lyndhurst's loss, Conn Smyth then owner of the Toronto Maple Leafs demanded that a NHL team be sent to Moscow immediately if not sooner to beat the pants off the Soviets. That never happened, because by that time it was spring in Russia where in 1954 there were no artificial ice rinks. In the years that followed even Canadian teams made up entirely of NHL players have suffered losses at the hands of the Russians and the USA. If medals had been awarded in 1954 which they weren't, East York would have won a Silver.

George Sayliss lived on White Pine in Parkview Hills and for many years sharpened skates at East York Memorial Arena. Today George, Norm Gray and the Lyndhurst team have largely been forgotten in East York but not so in Peterborough, the city where George Sayliss now lives, because his East York Lyndhurst sweater the one he wore in that Championship game together with his 1954 memorabilia have an honoured place in the Peterborough Hall of Fame.

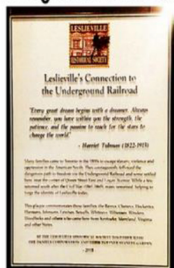

The Agnes Macphail Award

The Agnes Macphail Award [Ceremony](#) will be held on Sunday, March 29, 2020. The recipient is honoured with a medal and a framed certificate of recognition.

This year's nominees are Paula Davies and Raymond White.

Agnes Campbell Macphail (1890-1954) was once described as "the most important woman in public life that Canada has produced in the 20th century." She is now featured on the commemorative Canada 150 \$10 bill.

In 1921, two years after women gained the right to run for Parliament, she blazed a path with her election to the House of Commons in Ottawa where she served for 19 years until 1940. In 1943, she became the first woman to sit in the Ontario Legislature.

A member of the United Farmers of Ontario-Labour and the Co-operative Commonwealth Federation (CCF), she fought for equal pay, a Royal Commission on prison reform, international disarmament, and founded the Elizabeth Fry Society.

On March 24, 1993, Mayor Michael Prue proclaimed the first annual Agnes Macphail Day in the Borough of East York, in honour of the 50th anniversary of her election to the Legislature.

In January 1994, East York Council established the Agnes Macphail Award.
