

Karen Fraser and Ron Smith the home owners of <u>53</u> <u>Mallory Crescent</u> would like to thank their community for the support, help and kindness they received following the arrest of Bruce McArthur on January 18th. While the couple is mindful that they are a mere sidebar in a story of pain and horror it was difficult for them to shift from a pleasant morning at home with plans for the day, to a search warrant with minutes to leave their home, to waiting for hours at 51 Division to be questioned to standing on the street in the cold with nowhere to go.

Friends and neighbours responded immediately. The couple soon had a place to stay and offers of several others. Ongoing offers of dinners, tea/ scotch with cakes followed.

A neighbour's home became the staging area for the high-end cat food donated to save pets trapped in one room of the house. They endured numerous strangers in rustling hazmat suits and cadaver dogs searching their home while their human guardians seemed to have abandoned them.

Nearby businesses demonstrated why we should all shop local. The Feathers family at Olde Yorke Fish and Chips slipped gift certificates into an order allowing the couple to enjoy their comfort food particularly when they returned home.

Under the circumstances the notes, emails and messages passed along from the residents of Thorncliffe and Flemingdon Park. were greatly appreciated.

The members of the Church St., Village were extraordinary. They rose above the terror and expanding nightmare hanging over their neighborhood to offer complete strangers welcome, hugs, kind gifts and notes, the use of a condo and help to repair the backyard at 53 Mallory.

When the couple encountered one extremely upsetting issue they reached out to Councillor Jon Burnside for help. He acted immediately and effectively. Even

vibrant community minded neighbourhoods need extraordinary elected representatives. The couple are appreciative of the ongoing supportive emails and phone calls from Councillor Burnside and Premier Kathleen Wynne.

A group thank you to those who emailed, honked and flashed the peace sign and stopped the homeowners on the street to offer kind words.

At last on February 8 it was time to return home. One family had a welcome home event and others brought flowers Then the weary homeowners were told that the main drain had to be dug up and taken away. The city workers deserve a big thank you for their kindness and for being angry on the residents behalf.

A thank you also to the East York Historical Society under President Barnett for the help offered answering a question about the background of the property at 53 Mallory.

The officers of Toronto Police Services have the thanks, gratitude and admiration of the two residents. While meeting the rare challenge of a serial killer, working staggering hours under increasing pressure and facing down expanding horrors they managed to keep the couple's welfare served and protected.

When asked for their reaction to the upsetting series of events.Ron and Karen offered lines from a song of worship sung at the church vigil "in the end All that matters Is how we treat each other"

Introducing our guest speaker for May 29, 2018...

Topic: "The Frank O'Connor House"

Paul Farrelly was persuaded by an old friend Mary Fay to join the board of O'Connor Irish Heritage House with a goal to restore the 1931 colonial revival style estate house and coach house. In his illustrated talk he will describe over a decade of tenacious effort to identify the cultural heritage value and secure restoration and re-use of the property and the recovery of archival material profiling the life and times of Frank P. O'Connor.

Paul Farrelly left Ireland in his 20s in the early 70s and since lived in downtown Toronto. He was an operator of early computers which led to work in company administration but all the while engaged in theatre pursuits. This led to a decade at the Ireland Fund of Canada working to support peace and reconciliation for community projects there. Over the last decade, turning his interest to local community, he co-founded Church Wellesley Neighbourhood Association, was the neighbourhood co-sponsor of the Historic Yonge Heritage Conservation District. As Chair of the Toronto and East York Community Preservation Panel he is a member of Toronto Preservation Board.

DUNDAS-CARLAW: PLAQUE PRESENTATION ANNOUNCED

On June 17, join us as we unveil 10 historical plaques featuring a unique heritage district, the Dundas-Carlaw neighbourhood. In our last issue, we highlighted the area's industrial history based on our research for the plaques and an accompanying historical walk.

For this project, Heritage Toronto has collected the stories of the iconic buildings, businesses, and moments in the history of the neighbourhood. We have learned about, and from, the people who lived, worked, and sometimes played in the area: couples who met while working at the Carlaw factories, and entire families who were employed in the neighbourhood. They have told us about corporate Christmas parties, the Carlaw Softball League games that attracted hundreds, and much more.

This project is part of the Dundas Carlaw Public Realm Improvements. This community initiative, championed by Councillor Paula Fletcher, will highlight the unique sense of place created by the industrialization of Dundas-Carlaw and the adaptive reuse of its iconic factory buildings for residential and commercial uses.

Major upgrades to the public outdoor space in the neighbourhood are being implemented with the renovation of the Badgerow Parkette, and creation of several public art pieces that integrate historical structures, features, and storylines identified in a heritage study. When complete, the Carlaw + Dundas Community Initiative will rival other post-industrial revitalization projects like the Lachine Canal National Historic Site in Montreal and the Pearl District in Portland, Oregon. Cities around the world are looking to their past to build a brighter future: GQ Magazine and the Wall Street Journal recently ranked Dundee, Scotland, among their hot destinations for the city's post-industrial renaissance spurred by a billion-pound revitalization plan that includes a new Victoria & Albert (V&A) Museum.

***If you cannot make it to the June event, the Leslieville Historical Society are also creating a self-guided walking tour that will allow residents and visitors to dig deeper into the area's past. A print pamphlet will be available at local libraries and businesses. A digital tour will be developed and launch in 2019.

THE NAMING OF DIEPPE PARK

In the early morning of August 19, 1942 about 6,000 Allied troops embarked on 250 vessels from southern England on a daylight raid on the German occupied French resort town of Dieppe. Almost 5,000 of the troops were young Canadian men. They were well trained, but lacked battle experience. Along with the Canadians were British and French commandos and American Rangers, the first Americans to see action in Europe in the War.

The aim of the raid was to land on the beaches in and around Dieppe, occupy the town for about 12 hours and withdraw to England with as many German prisoners as possible. Another explanation for carrying out the raid was to test German defences for an upcoming Allied invasion of Europe. The raid on Dieppe was a failure. Of the 5,000 Canadians who embarked on the raid, almost 4,000 were killed, wounded or taken prisoner. Only a few of the men who landed on the beaches of Dieppe made it into the town. Of the 1,000 men who returned to England, 600 of them were wounded.

They brought back with them a handful of German prisoners. Inadequate information about German fortifications and poor Allied planning and equipment are two main reasons for the failure of the raid. No matter the reasons for failure, the fact remains that the failed raid on Dieppe is remembered with sadness about the lost of young Canadian men who, without hesitation, faithfully served their country.

About 4 months after the raid on Dieppe, on January 11, 1943, East York Township Council named the park site on Cosburn Avenue Dieppe Park, in honour

New Ward Boundaries for Toronto

The City of Toronto's 2018 municipal election will be conducted using a new 47 ward boundary model for Toronto, a change from the current 44 ward model. This new 47 ward model will take effect on December 1, 2018 when the new 2018 – 2022 term of City Council begins.

Many City Council ward boundaries have changed as a result of the new model. In some cases, entirely new City Council wards have been created, with only 7 City Council ward boundaries remaining the same. To help residents and businesses find their new ward, the City has created the MyVote app which provides Torontonians information about City Council wards based on an individual address and the candidates that will be running in that ward in the 2018 Municipal Election.

of the brave men who participated in the raid. The Council passed the following resolution.

"WHEREAS East York Township's manpower have responded to the call of the Country in this time of War. And

Whereas East York men were present at the Battle of Dieppe which was the opening Battle of the Allied offensive, and Whereas we have several park sites set aside in East York Township as yet unnamed. THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the East York Council name the park site that has been known as the Smith Property to Dieppe Park in honour of our men who fought the gallant battle also to those men who gave their lives, and at some future time a suitable plaque be placed in the park setting forth this purpose.

And the Seal of the Corporation be hereto affixed."

The naming of Dieppe Park is a significant chapter in East York's long and proud history of supporting the men and women who served our country. A plaque at Telscombe Cliffs, East Sussex, England has the following poignant inscription dedicated to the Canadians who fought in the raid on Dieppe: "Is it nothing to you, all ye who pass by A tribute to the memory of those gallant goodhearted Canadian boys who passed on fighting for us on the Dieppe Raid.

August 19, 1942, knowing what ought to be done and doing it at all costs. They were worthy of their country. They shall be greatly remembered for God proved them and found them worthy of himself."

A Ward Boundary review was conducted as Toronto's population had grown significantly since the last review in 2000. Some City Council wards had grown 30 per cent to 45 per cent above the average ward population. The City was concerned that the value of a resident's vote may not be equal across all wards if this trend continued. Information on the changes and process can be found on the Ward Boundary Review web pages.

The 47 ward boundary model is designed to last for four election cycles before a new ward boundary review is required (2018, 2022, 2026, and 2030).

REMEMBERING OUR HISTORY...

On May 17, 1952, the old Great Western Railway station at the foot of Yonge St. was destroyed by fire. Built in 1866, the building was converted to a bonded freight depot after the Grand Trunk Railway took over the GWR in 1882. When the GTR opened their Simcoe Street freight yards in 1904, the structure became the Toronto Fruit Terminal and hosted long lines of refrigerator cars from Florida and California that were parked along the Esplanade. The fire broke out about 6 AM and the 200 workers in the building escaped injury. Workmen clearing the debris found two old Grand Trunk flat cars still mounted on tracks that had been used to shore up portions of the ramshackle

structure. The fruit terminal was subsequently relocated to Mimico and the O'Keefe Centre for the Performing Arts opened on the station site in 1960.
