# THE ROAD TO AMALGAMATION By Hon. Alan Redway

At the stroke of midnight on December 31<sup>st</sup>, 1997, the incorporated municipality of East York ceased to exist. On January 1<sup>st</sup>, 1998 it became part of the newly amalgamated Megacity of Toronto.

During the late 1980s, two seemingly separate and unrelated events set the wheels in motion leading to amalgamation.

First was the decision by the government of Premier David Peterson to have direct election of Metro councillors a change from the original system whereby Metropolitan Toronto council was composed of members elected to their local councils. While direct election made democratic sense, the old city of Toronto council now viewed the directly elected Metro council not as a coordinator of Metro wide issues but as a rival Toronto council. As a direct result in a 1974 plebiscite a majority of the residents of old Toronto voted to succeed from the Municipality of Metropolitan Toronto. As well it was that decision to directly elect Metro councillors that caused former Toronto Mayor David Crombie and former Metro Chairman Paul Godfrey to conclude that it made no sense to have two separately elected councils both representing themselves as Toronto. Later it was their advice that persuaded Premier Mike Harris to legislate total amalgamation.

The second event was the decision by Premier Bob Rae, Premier David Peterson's successor to establish the Anne Golden Task Force to review the GTA. This decision also made immanent good sense, because the GTA was experiencing the same cross border problems that the original Metro municipalities had prior to the establishment of Metropolitan Toronto in 1954. However, none of the GTA municipalities agreed with the Anne Golden recommendation for a GTA wide Metro Council. Instead 4 of the GTA Mayors, Hazel McCallion, Mel Lastman, Barbara Hall and Nancy Diamond later joined by the 6 Metro Mayors submitted counter recommendations, which were akin to taking the GTA and Metro municipalities back to the state that existed before Metro was created. At that time each municipality understood that they had cross border problems but they could never agree on who would pay to solve them. So until Metro was established they were never solved.

The provincial government of Premier Mike Harris, successor to that of Premier Bob Rae, faced with the conflicting recommendations of the Anne Golden Report, those of the GTA and Metro Mayors and bombarded for years with Toronto Star, Globe and Mail and Toronto Sun editorials demanding amalgamation, decided to accept the recommendation of David Crombie and Paul Godfrey to eliminate The Municipality of Metropolitan Toronto with total amalgamation.

The citizens of Metro who had paid little heed as to what was happening, up until this point, rebelled when they learned the news. An Environics Poll at the time reported that 52% of Metro residents were opposed to amalgamation. Here, in East York residents formed Team East York to oppose the plan. East York and each of the other 5 Metro municipalities held a referendum on amalgamation. East Yorkers voted 81% against it. But to no avail, so on January 1, 1998, the municipality of East York passed into the history books.






## Historical Walk in Todmorden Village

### LIBRARY STORIES – MAKE YOUR VOICE HEARD ON THE CUTS

And here is information about the cuts to Ontario library services that were announced recently. The Southern Ontario Library Service (SOLS) and Ontario Library Service - North (OLS-North) have announced they are facing cuts to their budgets of 50 percent or more. These cuts represent a clear threat to library service in Ontario - particularly for rural, remote and Indigenous libraries - and cannot be accepted.

SOLS currently provides a number of services that are critical to the function of Ontario libraries:

- They provide a courier service that moves materials between public libraries, meaning the public gets free, easy and timely access to a broader range of materials than they'd normally find at their own libraries.
- They provide critical training at low or no cost to library staff. Topics span from kids' programs, to leadership, to skills for helping library staff ride out and mitigate the opioid crisis and rise of critical social issues affecting our communities.

This latter training helps library staff save lives by connecting people with resources they need. It also helps prevent library staff from developing PTSD, by giving us a sense of control over how we handle the heartbreaking situations we encounter.

• They give Ontario libraries a way to band together when purchasing expensive online resources.

Consequently, even people in the most remote locations have access to the best, most up-to-date research information.

- They provide resources to Indigenous libraries that help address the shortfall in funding they receive compared to other Ontario public libraries. This funding differential means that any cuts to SOLS will disproportionately affect Indigenous communities.

OLS-North (<u>http://www.olsn.ca/en</u>) provides many of the same services, plus extensive technology supports for libraries that cannot afford them otherwise. Because the libraries in the region tend to have much smaller budgets, the services provided by OLS-North are even more critical to their daily operations.
