SUNNYBROOK PLAZA

On Friday March 20th, 2020, Sunnybrook Plaza at the northeast corner of Eglinton and Bayview Avenues, was closed forever by its present owner Rio Can. Soon the site will be demolished to make way for two apartment towers, 11 and 16 stories respectively. According to the planners increasing residential density along the route

of the Eglinton Crosstown Light Rail Transit presently under construction is a necessity so that once the LRT is completed it will actually pay for itself. Work began on the Crosstown in 2015 and will be completed goodness knows when. Seven years ago a rear portion of the Sunnybrook Plaza property was sold to allow construction of a condominium. Soon there will be three apartment buildings at the northeast corner of Eglinton and Bayview Avenues instead of Ontario's first shopping plaza, the Borough of East York's Sunnybrook Plaza.

When the Township of East York merged with the Town of Leaside in 1967, Sunnybrook Plaza was thriving with retailers, including: Tamblyn Drugs, Laura Secord, Woolworth, Power Super Market, Hunt's Bakery, Reitman's, Scott Hardware, Woodham's Clothing, Ko's Linens, Sunnybrook Restaurant and the Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce.

Sunnybrook Plaza was opened in 1952, likely in anticipation of the Eglinton Avenue extension across the Don Valley to Don Mills Road and then on to Scarborough. That happened 4 years later. But in 1952 Eglinton came to an abrupt stop at Brentcliffe Road. Without the Province establishing The Municipality of Metropolitan Toronto in 1954, that extension would have never happened.

Sunnybrook Plaza itself was built by Principal Investments, founded by the three Bennet brothers, Archie, Dave and Jacob. Principal Investments went on to build and own shopping plazas across Canada including another in 1962, East York's Shoppers' World Danforth. That property formerly the site of the Ford Canada automobile assembly plant later Nash Rambler when Ford moved to Oakville was purchased by Principal Investments when Nash moved to Brampton.

That same year 1962 Principal Investments, by that time worth \$ 100 million, became financially over extended and collapsed. I remember that well because one of our close neighbours, Claire Scott, was their corporate lawyer. When Principal Investments went into receivership Claire joined the ranks of the unemployed. At the same time the three Bennet

brothers chose the occasion to bail out of the company leaving it in the hands of Archie's son Avie Bennet. He worked hard and eventually paid off the creditors and then went on to build many other shopping centres among them, the Lawrence Plaza and the Dixie Plaza.

I met Avie Bennet when he lived in the East York neighbourhood of Bennington Heights. I was his Alderman at that time but was unaware of his connection to Sunnybrook Plaza. He was an avid tennis player so he tried to lobby me for municipal money for the Bennington Heights tennis courts located at Bennington Heights

School on the East York Board of Education property. When I spoke to our Parks Director Ross Swain and our Recreation Director Ernie Heyes about this they both replied, talk to the Board of Education.

In 1985 Avie Bennet acquired the venerable Canadian publishing house, McClelland & Stewart located in our O'Connor industrial area at 25 Hollinger road. Later he hired Douglas Gibson who spoke at an East York Historical Society meeting last year as his editor. McClelland & Stewart published may best sellers including books by Margaret Atwood who grew up in Bennington Heights, East York.

Avie Bennet died in June 2nd, 2017.

Sunnybrook Plaza died March 20th, 2020.

The Queen's broadcast to the UK and Commonwealth Published 5 April 2020 "We should take comfort that while we may have more still to endure, better days will return" --Her Majesty The Queen



I am speaking to you at what I know is an increasingly challenging time. A time of disruption in the life of our country: a disruption that has brought grief to some, financial difficulties to many, and enormous changes to the daily lives of us all.

I want to thank everyone on the NHS front line, as well as care workers and those carrying out essential roles, who selflessly continue their day-to-day duties outside the home in support of us all. I am sure the nation will join me in assuring you that what you do is appreciated and every hour of your hard work brings us closer to a return to more normal times.

I also want to thank those of you who are staying at home, thereby helping to protect the vulnerable and sparing many families the pain already felt by those who have lost loved ones. Together we are tackling this disease, and I want to reassure you that if we remain united and resolute, then we will overcome it.

I hope in the years to come everyone will be able to take pride in how they responded to this challenge. And those who come after us will say that the Britons of this generation were as strong as any. That the attributes of self-discipline, of quiet good-humoured resolve and of fellow-feeling still characterise this country. The pride in who we are is not a part of our past, it defines our present and our future.

The moments when the United Kingdom has come together to applaud its care and essential workers will be remembered as an expression of our national spirit; and its symbol will be the rainbows drawn by children.



Society Member Mr. George James Matthew East Yorker

"A Brief History into the Life and times of Mr. George James Matthew"

Named after his father George Alexander Matthew....Scottish

(Aberdeen, Scotland in the Tiny Village of Tarves 20 miles in from the coast).


His parents Bertha Alice (Odd) Matthew nee Henshaw (British) **a**nd George A. Matthew both met in Canada at Donalda Farms (through her brother Charlie Henshaw) where George A. Matthew tended to Clydesdale Horses.

Bertha was first married to **Frank Odd** who was killed in the Great War. That marriage produced a daughter **Elizabeth Odd**. After Bertha and **George A...** got married they both had a daughter Katherine; then arrived George James Matthew making a total family of 5.


George James Matthew came into this world on the early morning of Friday, May 16, 1930...born in a home on Baltic Avenue, Toronto. At 6 y.o. he attended William Burgess School (Formerly known as Todmorden New School built in 1914 at 100 Torrens Avenue) from grades 1 - 8. Then went onto East York Collegiate Institute from grades 9 - 12.

Tired of not having his own money; his parents buying him clothes and father not making much money at Donalda Farms, (where he worked for 45 years until the Farm got sold to make way for Don Mills new development by E. P. Taylor).

George J. Matthew went to work at his first job as a mail room clerk on the 3rd floor within Singer Sewing Machine Company located then at 254 Yonge Street south of Dundas Street across from the former Silver Rail (now Eaton's Centre).

In the 1950's Singer, along with other businesses from Dundas to Queen west side were all torn down to make room for Eatons. Singer moved to 20, Bloor Street West between Bay and Yonge-2nd Floor of Zellers Building.

George even got to know Frank Stollery...1 Yonge Street West.. (quite a man) very well. George rose to the position as Manager of Singer, and often used to purchase Shirts from Stollery as part of Sales promotion for the Singer employees.

His employment with Singer amounted to 42 years. With the exception of 2 years

(when Singer closed all its stores in 1979 leaving one Singer Retail Store in Scarborough Town Centre Canada.


2 years, George was **employed** by Bruce R. Duncan Associates >a Consulting Firm (placing people for jobs) ? King Street East, 9th Floor, North corner of Yonge St.

George returned to Singer Industrial at the request of General Manager James Walsh whom George had trained many years ago in Toronto. This return came after Singer's Head Quarters moved back from Montreal.

This time his work allowed him to travel as far as Winnipeg, Halifax NS. & Maritimes. He would retire from Singer February 1990. Some Bonuses but no Awards/Medals.

At age 27 he married a former EYCI graduate Edith Middleton (they knew not each other at EYCI) on the 18th May, 1957 at 7 pm Presbyterian Westminster Church located on Floyd Ave. West of Pape Avenue. Edith was only 25 years old.

Edith quit her job at MacLean Hunter soon after marrying George. They had no children but George (emotions in voice) said-"perfect marriage".

Edith passed away in May, 2007 and is buried in St. James Cemetery. Shortly after Edith's passing he became a member of **East York Historical Society.**

Mr. Matthew Remembers when and enjoys:

His first car a yellow Chevy '55 with green interior. Quit smoking over 37 years ago Loves dancing. Social drinker occasional wine with dinner. Favorite Food roast beef. Remembers World War II. Hurricane Hazel, Bus fares 3c. Dawes Road became Victoria Park Avenue. When Logan Avenue was North Logan and ended at Gowan; there was a house situated right between Logan and Gowan that was eventually torn down. Logan since runs through Gowan, Cosburn and ends at Gamble. George's parents once owned 35 North Logan. However, the number changed to 1151 Logan after N. Logan's name changed...He talked a little bit about great guys like Alan Redway, the late Bill Lewis,


Norm and Doug Dyson...William Burgess in his 60's had a stroke and kept himself indoors a lot. George used to shovel snow off their property at 30, N. Logan and only saw Mrs. Burgess and other family members.

To this day his father George Alexander Matthew can be seen in a couple of photographs on the walls of the Donalda Club.

George, now living as happy as can be since 1982 at 81, Glencrest Blvd. East York.

Mr. Matthew (emotion and sniffles in voice)"I miss my wife, she was great"!.

CHAPTER XLVI. EXECUTIONS IN TORONTO. The End of the Brook's Gang...See January 2020 EY Inklings Newsletter of EYHS "Murder Most Foul" Joanne Doucette's Article for EYHS Article Sourced> J. Doucette and P. Barnett

...for years the Brook's Bush gang members boasted of getting away with killing a black man. (*Globe,* Oct. 30, 1856) This is the first racially motivated murder of a black man that I have found in my 30 or more years of researching Toronto's history.

"James Brown was executed at the old jail on Monday, the 10th March, 1862, for the murder of (the brilliant, 6 ft. tall and handsome) Mr. J. S. Hogan, M.P.P. The latter had disappeared about the 1st December, 1859, and the Government subsequently offered a reward for his discovery, or that of his body, and commissioned Detective Wartell, of the Toronto police force, to trace his movements. He went to several American cities, but could find no trace of him, and the matter was almost forgotten. About sixteen months after his disappearance a human skeleton, having yet some flesh on the bones and enveloped in male attire, was found in the marsh. The clothing was identified as that of Mr. Hogan, and an abandoned woman, one of the old Brooks' bush gang, named Ellen McGillick, made a statement to Detective Colgan which led to the arrest of Brown. She stated that she had witnessed the murder of Mr. Hogan on the King street Don bridge one night in December, 1859, by another abandoned woman named Jane Ward, Brown and two other men named Sherrick and McEntameny, the lastmentioned of whom had meanwhile died. Brown, Sherrick and Ward were arrested, and McGillick's evidence was to the effect that Ward had struck Mr. Hogan on the head with a stone tied in a handkerchief, when Brown and Sherrick robbed him and threw him into the river. Her evidence was partially corroborated by Maurice Malone, Dr. Gamble, and others. Police Magistrate Gurnett committed the three for trial, which took place before the three for trial, which took place before the late Chief Justice Draper in April, 1861. Mr. James Doyle, counsel for the prisoner, succeeded in establishing an alibi for Sherrick, several witnesses swearing that at the time at which the murder was alleged to have been committed he was living at Clover Hill, 50 miles from Toronto. The result was that the jury acquitted Sherrick and Ward. Mr. Doyle offered the same evidence to show that McGillick's statement was unworthy of credence, but the Chief Justice ruled it out. The jury found Brown guilty, but Mr. Doyle


succeeded in getting a new trial, when Brown was again found guilty and sentence by Mr. Justice Burns to be hanged on March 16, 1862 The late Mr. Henry Eccles prosecuted at the first trial, and the late Chief Justice Morrison and the late Mr. Richard Dempsey at the second. When sentence was passed upon him Brown declared his innocence. He had a dogged and sullen aspect, which was made more obnoxious by a scar on his nose caused by disease. He was born in Loulam, Cambridgeshire, Eng., and was 32 years old years of age when executed. He expressed contrition before his death, and declared his innocence unnervingly to the last, and with such earnestness that the ministers who attended to him, among whom were Rev. H. J., afterwards Dean Grasett, and Revs. Edmund Baldwin and S. J. Boddy, expressed their belief in his innocence. He was executed at the old jail, before an immense concourse of people, whom he addressed as follows:

'This is a solemn day for me, boys. I hope this will be a warning to you against bad company. I hope it will be a lesson to all young people, old as well as young, and rich and poor. It was that brought me here to-day to my last end, though I am innocent of the murder I am about to suffer for. Before my God I am innocent of the murder. I never committed the murder. I know nothing of it. I am going to meet my Maker in a few minutes. May the Lord have mercy on my soul. Amen. Amen.'

The "Amen" was echoed by a few near the scaffold. When he was launched into eternity three or four strong spasms shook his frame and then all was over. The body was delivered at the request of deceased to Mr. Irish for burial. The crowd was not as large as that which witnessed the execution of Fleming and O'Leary.
