

EAST YORK HISTORICAL SOCIETY MEMBERS & GUESTS TIPS FOR USING 200m

- We will be holding our September 29, 2020 @7PM meeting virtually using the Zoom meeting collaboration application.
- If you are not already familiar with it, please allow about 30 minutes before the meeting to download and set up the application, and familiarize yourself with its features

Download at: https://zoom.us/

- Make sure to set up and test the sound features in advance
- Zoom allows meeting participants to see and hear each other, and share a view of files. When you first download the application, you will be able to set up your personal Profile to include your display name and photo.
- Zoom allows you to control whether or not you display a live camera view (Video) of yourself, and the muting/unmuting of your sound (Microphone).
- Controls for these and other capabilities can be found by HOVERING your cursor in the upper right and lower left corners of your screen.
- When you join a meeting, turn on your Video to allow people to see you if you choose.
- Use the Microphone to unmute yourself to be heard. Make sure the sound on your device is turned up! Hover your cursor in the lower left of the display to find these controls. Please MUTE yourself whenever you are not actually speaking to minimize background noise (pets, TV, ringing phones) which can be very distracting.
- You can choose to view either just the current speaker, or all of the participants at once using the Speaker/Gallery icon at the top right of the display. If you choose Gallery, you will see all participants and the box of the person speaking will have a highlighted border. Speaker view is a better choice to provide an enlarged view when someone is speaking
- Also along the bottom of the display are options for Participants, Chat, etc.
 Using Participants, you can rename yourself, virtually raise your hand, and turn
 mute off and on. Opening Chat allows you to communicate in a separate chat
 screen with everyone or an individual while the meeting progresses.
- Please plan to join our upcoming meeting about 25 minutes in advance so that we can start the meeting on time. See you soon!

Norman Desmond Dyson, QC (June 7, 1932 – May 30, 2020)

A fellow East York Kiwanis Member



On behalf of the Kiwanis of East York I have been tasked to highlight the life of the Honourable Mr. Justice Norman Dyson. As I do not believe I had the privilege of meeting him this is a research project for me. I am discovering a man of many talents and interests. A compassionate man with a strong sense of right from wrong. A man who never seems to have forgotten his roots; the community that breathed life into him and taught him values and virtues that would last a life time. Norm carried the true spirit of East York throughout his life.

Natural causes due to declining health over several months took the life of Norm Dyson in his 89th year. Just weeks prior, he and his wife Rose celebrated their 55th wedding anniversary.

Norm, a father of two children, Arthur and Anna (Christopher) Sharples of New York, and grandfather of Harrison Sharples. He is predeceased by his parents Arthur Morris Dyson and Winifred Barry. His eldest brother Edward (Norma) and youngest brother Wayne passed before him. Surviving siblings are Douglas (Betty), Dwight (Sonia) and sister Anny (Richard).

Norm grew up in the heart of East York at Pape and O'Connor. As any true East Yorker he spent many happy hours exploring the Don Valley. A member of the East York Collegiate football team, the coaches instilled a love of sports, which included good sportsmanship and fairness. Qualities that would serve him well throughout his life. To honour those coaches, Norm co-founded the Hager, Hull and Miller scholarship. After playing as Quarter Back for the East York Goliaths, Norm continued as Quarter Back for the Golden Gaels at Queen's University. His athletic prowess included basketball plus track and field achievements which include the winning presentation of the North American Hurdling Championship.

His interest in sports followed him throughout his life as he watched his son Arthur play professional tennis. Norm, a member of the Rosedale Tennis Club, played with "Leo and the gang" from the time the first net went up in the spring to last down in the year. Snow may have garnished the ground on several occasions. As Norm aged, he took up lawn bowling at the RCYC and perhaps had a game or two at the East York Lawn Bowling clubs too. He enjoyed sailing upon many of Ontario's lakes, as well as Lake Ontario, and thus continued to be active.

In 1958, as a recent graduate of Osgoode Hall, Norm established a law firm, and then a second a few years later. For 35 years he developed a reputation as being a passionate advocate for his clients and a formidable foe on the courtroom floor. Perhaps his proudest

moment came in 1995 when he was appointed Judge on the Superior Court of Justice.(2) He served in that capacity until his retirement in 2007 which occurred "on his 75th birthday, after 12 years of unstinting and distinguished service to the public. The Honourable Norman Dyson personifies the dedication and commitment to service that I have observed from all of our judges, especially when our judicial complement was not at full strength. Indeed, at one point in 2006, we saw as many as 16 unfilled judicial vacancies on the Superior Court." (3)

As mentioned earlier, Norm's daughter Anna lives in New York City. While visiting her in the late spring of 1998, Norm asked to attend the last preparatory meeting for the International Criminal Court (ICC). Having a keen interest for an international mechanism, this enthusiasm was felt at the meeting and instantly assured him a place as a representative for the Canadian Branch of the World Federalist Movement. Referring to the voting as a miracle, (after what he had seen at the New York meetings), he was pleased when on July 17, 1998, the Rome Statute of ICC was adopted. As a Judge, he knew that the International Criminal Court would be a welcomed platform as it provides non-military resolutions to those who commit serious breaches of International Criminal Law. (4)

Norm joined Kiwanis on January 17, 1989 and was President of our Club in 1995 -96. He has delighted many a resident at True Davidson Acres by entertaining them on the piano prior to the Kiwanis Bingo games. He will be fondly remembered, and sadly missed. This photo was contributed by Rose Dyson, Norman's wife. He is seen playing the piano at the Christian Resource Centre with Jenji Jovero in the photo below.



Former mayor of East York, Mayor Alan Redway also shared these memories: "I have many memories myself. I first had contact with him personally when I was a MP and he was acting for M-Trac concerned with the transport of dangerous goods by rail through Toronto.I had a derailment in my riding near the Inn on the Park. I interacted with Norm and Harold Morrison the President of M-Trac many times, spoke in the House and lobbied the Minister on the issue but almost 40 years later we still have dangerous goods being shipped into Toronto. Few remember the Mississauga derailment in 1979.

Alan Redway also told me of the parkette on Pape near the Leaside Bridge named for Norm's dad Art Dyson who was also a Member of EY Kiwanis and played an important part in recreation in EY (see Alan Redway's book with his photo). Norm worked with his dad, a plumber, as a school boy installing plumbing in McClintock homes built in EY and Scarborough".

He was Doug's little brother — tagging along."


Hi Pat. As you asked I have written **a memorial** to my brother-in-law Nizam. "On Thursday, August 13, 2020, at the age of 82 my brother-in-law, Mohamed Nizam Baksh, died from covid complications in Florida (despite all the necessary precautions). Nizam was born in, British Guyana (now just "Guyana"), attended Queen's College in Georgetown and was awarded a full scholarship to the Eastern Caribbean Institute of Agriculture and Forestry earning a degree in Science of Agriculture. He subsequently worked as a Manager at a sugar estate. Along with his family, Nizam emigrated to the United States in 1978, escaping political strife in his native country. He and his wife Rahema, struggled to earn money to put their daughters through college. They resided in Massachusetts for 26 years before moving to Orlando, Florida where they remained for the past 15 years. Nizam warmly welcomed me into his family when I married his "little sister", June in 1973, and we have all been close ever since, he assuring us that

his home in Florida was our "home away from home". As a devout Muslim, Nizam made it his mission in life to always help out the needy. We all miss him."

Review of DR. JOHN CHARLES CARTER book "PLOUGHBOY" First published in the Spring 2020 edition of Ontario History.





The Perils and Pitfalls of the Steamer Ploughboy

A Story of its Construction to Destruction

By John C. Carter

Essex, Ontario: Essex Region Conservation, 2018. 86 pages. \$15 softcover. ISBN 9781999456504. (jrph@erca.org)

This short book details the career of the steamer *Ploughboy*, owned by Thomas, John, and Theodore Park, whose company operated thirty-five vessels on the Upper Lakes, in the mid nineteenth century. Using contemporary newspapers, shipping magazines, and personal letters and diaries John Carter fleshes out the story of one steamer, giving the reader a sense of life and work aboard such a vessel. Steamers played a critical role in the economic development and settling of Canada West. Carter has added to our understanding of

these vessels and their place in Great Lakes maritime history.


The Parks purchased the *Ploughboy* from William and Walter Ebert in 1854. Since its launch in 1851 the *Ploughboy* had been employed in carrying people and goods between Chatham and Amherstburg, Ontario, and Detroit, Michigan. Over the course of the next sixteen years *Ploughboy* plied two major routes in the upper Great Lakes. The first was from Buffalo, New York, to communities along the north shore of Lake Erie and on to Cleve-

land, Ohio. In 1858, as the first route became economically unfeasible, the steamer moved to weekly trips from Collingwood, Ontario to the isolated settlements along the east and north shore of Georgian Bay and on to Sault Ste. Marie and St. Joseph, with monthly journeys into Lake Superior to Fort William.

Ploughboy carried every type of cargo imaginable, from cattle, pigs, and chick-

ens, to various types of cloth, wood, commercial goods from the southern cities to northern lake shore communities, and at times the Royal Mail. It also dealt in passengers along each of its routes and played a role in carrying settlers to the far reaches of Western Canada. It also seems to have had an occasional involvement in the illegal running of rum between the United States and Canada.

Each chapter in the book covers a year, or short sequence of years, in the vessel's life. Most are only two or three pages. Chapter length appears to be governed largely by the availability of source material. The events of 1859 lead to a rather robust chapter, as the disaster the ship narrowly avoided could have cost Canada West most of its provincial government cabinet, including then Premier John A. Macdonald. Ploughboy was headed to Little Current when mechanical failure left the vessel drifting off Lonely Island, in Georgian Bay, headed for the rocky shore. With the anchor out to its full length and not grabbing bottom, the passengers and crew felt their inevitable fate close at hand. But the anchor finally took hold and kept the steamer off the rocks, and death at bay. The ship was towed back to Collingwood



for repairs. Carter uses numerous newspapers, letters and diaries to tell the story of this incident from the perspectives of various crew members and passengers.

In 1863 the *Plough-boy* was at the centre of a murder and the drowning of four crew members. The murder was of fishery superintendent William Gibbard. Gibbard had been part of a group of police sent aboard the *Ploughboy*

to Manitoulin Island to settle a fishing dispute with local Indigenous groups. Arresting an Indigenous leader, they returned to the *Ploughboy*. After sending the prisoner ashore, at Killarney, Gibbard could not be found aboard ship. His body was retrieved from Georgian Bay two days later. His murder was never solved, though blame first fell on the Indigenous prisoner. Carter notes that gambling debts may have had more of a hand in Gibbard's demise. Later in the year, a mechanical failure again stranded the *Ploughboy*, this time off Barrie Island. Crew members headed off in boats to get assistance. One of these was bound for Detour (on the American side of Lake Huron). The men in this boat were struck by large waves, washing out four of them. Among these four drowned men was Herbert Park, son of the *Ploughboy's* owner John Park. Herbert's body was never recovered.

The following year *Ploughboy*, getting older and out of date, was turned into a steam tug and renamed *T.F. Park*. The craft made daily trips from Detroit up the St. Clair River to Lake Huron to tow vessels down bound past Detroit. *T.F Park* also participated in the occasional rescue of stranded boats between Lakes Huron and

Erie. In 1870, the steam tug was sold to James Valentine, of Detroit, who intended to refit it as a passenger steamer. Unfortunately, it caught fire and was a complete wreck.

The steamer had its share of running aground, and mechanical breakdowns. Significant damage was usually repaired in Detroit, or parts were sent from there, or Buffalo, to Collingwood. This speaks to the Americans having the necessary ship repair facilities on the Great Lakes, ahead of Canada. Carter notes that steamers competed with the steam train for providing service to communities around the lakes. In some places, trains replaced ship travel and in others ships helped to advance the rail lines (by carrying cargo for railway construction).

Carter's sources include a wide swath of contemporary newspaper articles and shipping news items, as well as account books, private letters, and diaries, along with secondary sources. The resulting bibliography for this volume is worth the price itself. Images are spread throughout the book, most dealing with the Park fam-

ily, or the *Ploughboy*. The cover is a particular gripping image of the events off Lonely Island. Three appendixes give list of vessels owned by the Parks, a timeline for the *Ploughboy*, and two images related to the Park family. The first two appendices are useful, the third seems unnecessary.

There is a spacing problem on pages 16 and 17, where the text ends a third of the way down the first, resuming on the next, leaving an empty gap. The second is the verbatim repetition of the information about registration of the *Ploughboy* with the *British Registry of Shipping Inland Waters* and its valuation, see pages 12 and 17. These are small problems that ultimately do not detract from the solid research and the fine story of this steamer's career on the Great Lakes.

This book would be of interest to those studying the merchant trade on the lakes, steamship development and career, and the mid-nineteenth-century history of Canada West.

She previously worked as a secretary, payroll manager, and model. In her later life, she was a trained pianist with The Royal Conservatory of Music.

The Chretiens celebrated their 63rd wedding anniversary 2 days before her passing.
