



Introduction Summary of "THE BIRTH OF EAST YORK" 1924 - 2024



“East York was incorporated as a direct result of the incorporation of North York 2 years earlier. That resulted in the remainder of York Township being split into two entirely separate parts. In order to travel from one part to the other it was necessary to go through at least one other separately incorporated municipality. So, after examining the options the York Township Council petitioned the Provincial government asking it to incorporate the eastern part of the Township as a separate municipality.

The province granted the request but with the condition that a majority of the residents vote in favour of it.

The Provincial government of the day, the United Farmers of Ontario, believed in grassroots democracy unlike the present governments, at all levels, that tell us rather than ask us what to

do. In this case the outcome of the vote was by no means certain. A few years earlier the businesspeople of eastern York Township had petitioned the now greatly expanded City of Toronto to annex them into the City and Toronto City Council not only agreed but put the bureaucratic wheels in motion to do just that. But that was 1913, the next year WWI broke out and that put the plan on the back burner never to surface again until the end of WWII.

The vote to incorporate the Township of East York passed by a wide margin.

So, on January 1, 1924, the Township of East York was born”.



Toronto just got a new home that's the first of its kind

Toronto just got its first garden suite in Leaside after the neighbourhood came this summer to build the city's first home of its kind in an incredible act of community spirit. Cathy Faye had the idea to provide a friend with the affordable housing option right in her backyard after they were priced out of the neighbourhood nearly a decade ago. But between the cost of construction (her

initial quote was around \$500,000) and logistical obstacles (garden suites weren't legal until 2022), she couldn't actually start building until this year.

The bylaws state that there is no minimum lot size required to build a garden suite, but also stipulate that "not all properties will be able to accommodate a garden suite."



Adam Baguley, who grew up nearby and currently builds custom homes in the city through his company The Mada Group, says that he was between projects when he got contacted about the idea. "My friend called me and said that his mom wanted to build a house in her backyard for her friend, so that her friend could have affordable housing and retire," he said.

At first, Baguley was content to provide Faye with a list of companies that could build the suite for her, but when he heard that everything he recommended was out of their price range, he decided to take on the project himself — free of charge.

Faye covered the costs of the materials and paid the labourers' wages, but in the end, paid a fraction of the cost it would've been otherwise.

Baguley says that once each stage of her build was approved by a city inspector, the three-month construction process went smoothly thanks to the help of local architecture firm, Rubinoff Design Group.

"[Rubinoff] knows all the bylaws, so the process of getting the building permit was quite smooth," Faye said.

"This was a community endeavour," she continued. "I had friends, neighbours, and family helping out whenever possible to keep costs down."

The result? Toronto's first garden suite, which officially became occupied on August 1.

IN MEMORY OF DR. BEVERLEY SALMON CM OOnt TORONTO'S FIRST "BLACK" MUNICIPAL COUNCILOR

December 25, 1930 – July 6, 2023

Obituary

Known in the community as a trailblazer, activist and community leader, Beverley Salmon passed away peacefully on July 6th, 2023 at age 92.

To her family, extended family, and a multitude of friends, Bev was known as a loving, kind, graceful, warm, compassionate, and intelligent woman. She was generous with her time and genuinely interested in helping others.

She led a life of service and was an advocate for the marginalized and disenfranchised. Bev worked tirelessly and courageously as a champion of fair and equitable treatment for all regardless of their race, gender identity, sexual expression, ability or ethnicity. Bev was a social justice warrior.

Her career began as a nurse graduating from Wellesley Hospital class of 1953 with the distinction of Most Outstanding Nurse. While she had not practiced for many years, Bev has "mothered" and "nursed" countless people facing difficulties and personal problems over the years. Beverley was not only known for leading with a sympathetic ear, but would not hesitate to step in as a point person to help people resolve issues and move forward.

She broke ground becoming Toronto's first black municipal councilor serving as an elected official for 12 years. She was a mentor, advisor and key contributor on many Council committees, and organizations including the Urban Alliance on Race Relations and the Ontario Human Rights Commission.

Beverley is survived by her children Warren Salmon, Heather Regal Salmon (and Donald Regalmuto), Leslie Salmon Jones (and Jeffrey W. Jones), and her grandchildren Caitlyn Salmon, Shakarri Salmon, Tyler Boffa Salmon, Jordan Boffa Salmon, Sierra Salmon, her sister Marjorie Sorrell, sister in law Kaaren Bell (wife of David) and many nieces and nephews.



She is predeceased by her late husband Dr. John Douglas Salmon, eldest son Dr. John Douglas Salmon Jr. and siblings Herbert Bell, Dr. David V.J. Bell, and Rena Jones.

Bev has received numerous awards including the Order of Canada, Order of Ontario, Honorary Doctorate of Laws from Ryerson University, Harry Jerome President's Award, African Canadian Achievement Award, Bicentennial Award (ON), Queen Elizabeth 11 Diamond Jubilee Medal, Onyx Lions Club Award, Canadian Black Achievement Award for Politics, Canadian Centre for Police-Race Relations Award of Excellence and the Daniel G. Hill Award.

A parkette was dedicated in Bev's name in her neighborhood as a tribute to her contributions municipally when she retired from Council.

In high school, Douglas was steered towards what were considered "commercial" courses. He graduated at the top of his class but knew he wanted to become a doctor which meant university. He worked days and upgraded his secondary schooling at night for two years to get the necessary subjects.

While attending the University of Toronto Douglas was one of only four black students in his medical school class. Although he did receive a scholarship he still had to work part-time in order to cover his expenses. By his second year, Douglas was voted class president.

Douglas was an accomplished pianist and had formed a musical group, "Doug Salmon & his Orchestra," which entertained at various functions in and around Toronto. Douglas also became a protest leader on the Race Discrimination Committee, which battled for the rights of blacks to enter Toronto's Palais Royale to see jazz greats such as Duke Ellington.

In 1954, Douglas's sister introduced him to Beverley Bell, a young Victorian Order nurse, and they married in 1956. They had four children: J. Douglas Jr., Warren, Heather and Leslie.

After retiring from Centenary Hospital in 1995, Dr. Salmon joined the Rudd Clinic in downtown Toronto and later retired from practice in 1997.

Dr. Salmon was a fellow of the Royal College of Surgeons and a fellow of the American College of Surgeons. In recognition of his outstanding stature and service to the community, he was awarded the Canadian Black Achievement Award, Medicine.



City of Toronto promises to learn from Eglinton Crosstown LRT when building Ontario Line

After the absolute [nightmare](#) of [more than a decade of construction](#) on the Eglinton Crosstown LRT — which is still somehow [not yet open](#) to the public — the City of Toronto is hoping Metrolinx will learn from its past mistakes when embarking on its next monster of a project, the Ontario Line subway. Cutting 15.6 km across the city from Exhibition Place to the [current](#) Science Centre, the 15-stop line will require an unfathomable amount of work, from [building condos](#) as part of [transit-oriented communities](#) around select stations to excavating tunnels and [brand new](#)



[stops](#) around extremely busy key intersections, [shutting them down for years](#).

With work expected to wrap up in 2031, the transit agency is gearing up for not just the work, but the flurry of public complaints that are bound to pour in as a result of it, which staff should be experts at fielding by now after so many years of people bemoaning the interruptions and inconveniences caused [by ongoing Crosstown Eglinton construction](#).

A City subcommittee on the project this week finalized [a series of recommendations](#) for Metrolinx to keep in mind during the process, ranging from developing community benefit plans and creating job opportunities to forming construction liaison committees to

ensure "inclusive and meaningful two-way communication regarding the Ontario Line." Also mentioned are ways that traffic caused by road closures can be better managed and how the public can be better kept abreast of updates. There is also a portion that explicitly calls out the LRT and the impacts it had on local establishments that saw decreased foot traffic and business as a result of the chaos that earned Eglinton Avenue the title of [the worst street in the city](#) more than once.

Under the Business Supports heading, the committee writes that Metrolinx needs to "meet on a regular basis with Business Improvement Areas (BIAs) and

the city's BIA office to develop business support solutions based on lessons learned from the Eglinton Crosstown LRT to mitigate construction impacts on businesses from the Ontario Line." This should include, the document states, the creation of a marketing strategy to promote and support local businesses, install improved signage and wayfinding for customers, accommodate consumer parking needs, track economic effects of construction, and more. As work starts on the Ontario Line this year, the Eglinton LRT isn't set to be ready until [sometime in 2024](#), four years later than initially expected.

Dear Trust Supporters and Friends,

News of the death in Newmarket, Ontario of Kirk Howard on 30th June, 2023 at age eighty saddened all associated with The Canadian Royal Heritage Trust and its work. Among long standing supporters especially, Kirk was gratefully remembered as the Trust's founding Chairman..

Kirk worked actively in the setting up of the Trust in 1994, was one of the founding Trustees, presided as its head until 2009 and, after stepping down, continued as a Trustee for the rest of his life. He assisted the Trust financially and through his work and influence as an important Canadian publisher. For many years he provided the Trust with a website through his publishing company Dundurn.

Kirk's understanding of the importance of history and its role in sustaining the country was profound. Unlike so many who professed attachment to Canada and its heritage he knew that the royal could not be amputated from the identity of Canada without severely endangering its viability. So, as a publisher he not only published works dealing with the Monarchy but caused individuals knowledgeable about aspects of the Crown to write about them or about dimensions that had not been covered. Kirk's exceptional service to history and letters in Canada was recognized by his appointment as a Member of the Order of Canada in 2018. In 2002 and 2012 he received the Queen's Golden and Diamond Jubilee Medals on the nomination of the CRHT.

One thing is certain. The great good he did to the cause of royal heritage, which we have at heart, will continue to make itself felt for many years to come.



Moriyama's architectural jewel, the Japanese Canadian Cultural Centre, was created as a safe gathering space for displaced Japanese Canadians who strove to establish a community in Toronto after the Second World War. Creative and cost-effective design was essential due to the limited budget. Most Japanese Canadians were struggling to rebuild their lives, but managed to fund the construction, including 75 individuals who risked their own financial futures by signing the mortgage so the centre could be built. An Architect is Sharing Strange and Surprising Facts about Toronto Buildings on TikTok

Toronto is full of stunning buildings, and you may be walking past Toronto TikToker Anne Vranic, known as [@historyhypegirl](#) on

Instagram and TikTok, has made it her mission to

breathe life into the city's architecture by educating us about its buildings, and her videos will leave you a little more educated about the place we call home. Vranic told me her motivation to "put our city back on the architectural map," came from a place of frustration after one of her idols, Anthony Bourdain, described Toronto as "Soviet-chic" and "butt-ugly."

Here's a list of some of the most exciting facts and stories about Toronto buildings that Vranic has shared in her videos:



1. Casa Loma was a top-secret military research facility during World War II.

It's also where an early form of sonar detection was

manufactured. During that time, over 48,000 units of the sonar device were manufactured and were integral in the Allied victory at sea.



2. Richard Burton proposed to Elizabeth Taylor at the Sovereign Ballroom in the King Edward Hotel.

The pair used the hotel "as their not-so-secret den of iniquity while they were both married to other people," Vranic shared with blogTO.

3. There is an actual heart buried inside St Basil's Church.

4. Toronto's Flatiron building, the Gooderham building, is 10 years older than New York's iconic Flatiron building.

That means we can claim to be the first city with the iconic structure.



5. Elvis Presley stayed at the King Edward Hotel in the 50s.

The hotel "also made headlines across the universe when The Beatles chose the royal suite as their crash

pad during their first Toronto visit," according to Vranic.

6. Star Trek used the Toronto City Hall building "not once, but TWICE as an alien portal," said Vranic.



7. The beacon at the top of the Canada Life building on University Avenue changes colour depending on the weather.

It acts as a weather broadcast that's visible from almost every corner of downtown.

8. The Hemingway community residence building is where Ernest Hemingway lived during his six months of working for the Toronto Star.



9. Toronto's famous Zanzibar strip club was featured in Marvel's *The Incredible Hulk*.

You can see a peek of the iconic joint during Hulk's final battle scene.

10. There's a hilarious story about the faces carved into the structure of Old City Hall.

The architect behind the structure, EJ Lennox, carved the faces of city councilmen onto the building out of spite after they refused to place a plaque acknowledging his hard work outside the building

Vranic's interest in architecture and Toronto's history was sparked during the pandemic when everything shut down, and she had to turn to walking around the city for entertainment.

"I started reading historical plaques outside of buildings and quickly learned our city's architecture is so much more than meets the eye," said Vranic.

"In a world where many of us are glued to our smartphones and rarely take the time to look up, it's easy to forget that architecture is a form of accessible art and artifact, and that buildings - old and new - have some of the best stories to tell (or tea to spill).




